We continue working on our Annual Diocesan Appeal. As you know, we have gone over our assessed amount in pledges and gifts. Including pledges being paid over time, we have approximately \$10,000 left to pay on our parish assessment. Reading I: Genesis 14:18-20

Why Go to Church?

Many people today, especially younger people, say they believe in God and are on a spiritual quest, but they do not need an organized religion to help them.

Sunday's Mass will make the question especially poignant. To put things in the worst light, why would you Catholics go each week to be handed a flat wafer called a "host" and perhaps a small sip of wine? It seems like a lot of trouble, and would appear to have very little to do with the spiritual quest.

As Catholics, we answer that the host is no longer "bread" but has undergone a "transubstantiation." To put that in simpler terms, even though the host has an appearance of a piece of bread, its substance has been transformed from that of bread to that of Christ's body. The same goes for the wine.

Non-church believers might reply,

aren't God and spirituality something interior, something private? Wouldn't the point be that we should help each other? Why can't we do it without all the paraphernalia, without all this 'body and blood' business?

Let's attempt an answer.

Christian Catholic beliefs are a direct result of what we believe about Jesus.

- (1) He is a speaking-out of God's love. He and the Father are one, as the scriptures attest.
- (2) He died on the cross in a showdown between goodness and the forces of selfishness and greed.
- (3) Evil won. But at his depths, Christ was deeper than evil. He was made of something stronger than either life or death. This something endured even though he was dead and buried. What was it? Love, the kind founded on the life of Jesus. He was the direct expression of God-love. Jesus emerged from the tomb because he was rooted in God-love.
- (4) Then he ascended into heaven, as we saw. It looked

like he left us behind. But he sent the Holy Spirit into the hearts of those who believe so that he would still be present to us. Pentecost was the full expression of this fact.

Fine so far, as our churchless brothers and sisters might agree:

But this Holy Spirit of God dwells deep in the wordless depths of a person. You have proved our point. We do not need ceremonies and ritual.

Are they right?

Not quite. Look at it this way. When you are hungry and you want, say, a hamburger, does thinking about a burger do the job? Since your hunger is internal, why does it need an answer in the material world,?

Nonsense.

We human beings do have spiritual insides and they are very important, but we have an outside too. We are not built to just stay within ourselves but in addition to let our spirits walk, play, and even suffer in the material world. The Holy Spirit's presence at the depths of our being makes us desire to find Jesus with our eyes, ears, nose, tongue and hands.

And that is why we go to Church. In order to find the answer to our spiritual quest, in the real, fleshly presence of Christ. At Mass, a ritual, we find presence given to our senses in Communion. It comes from the exterior, and it fulfills our interior, spiritual and physical yearning.

Are you hungry for Christ? Come and eat.

You are what you eat, you know.

Toward Jerusalem

Jesus is fierce in Sunday's Gospel. He is on the march and will not be turned back. Sometimes the readings startle us.

He "rebukes" the disciples.

He shouts, "let the dead bury the dead" to a man who wants to bury his father and then follow Jesus.

He is moving fast, and his mood is intense. Get ready for it. But what is the reason for his intensity?

Do you remember back when Jesus began his public ministry? We heard about this before Lent and Easter. He came from the desert filled with the Holy Spirit, and headed straight to his home town, Nazareth. He wanted to preach his mission. But his own townspeople rejected him. They were more than blunt about it: they tried to throw him off a cliff (Luke 4:14ff).

Formerly we were in the "Galilean Ministry" (Luke 3:1-9:50), as scholars call it (except for the insertion of Lent and Easter). Now a new section of Luke begins. It is called the "Journey to Jerusalem" (Luke 9:51-19:28). This new phase begins with a rejection of Jesus.

He leaves his home town. The people in Samaritan towns turn him away. He had sent messengers ahead to "warm up the audience," so to speak, but the villagers would not let him enter. Jews and Samaritans were hostile to each other, and surely that is part of the reason for the rejection of him. But Luke says the real reason is that they knew he was "going up to Jerusalem."*

"Going up to Jerusalem." Think about that phrase. The "going up" part is literal, since Jerusalem is built upon a hill or rise and you have to climb to get up to it. But Luke wanted the metaphorical sense too. Jesus had set his face to go up to the height of the cross.

The Greek word Luke uses for "go up" is the same one used in the Second Book of Kings for the prophet Elijah's ascent into heaven (2 Kings 2:11).

A flaming chariot and flaming horses came ... and Elijah

went up to heaven in a whirlwind.

But Jesus' "going up" will not be in a fiery chariot. His "ascent" will end up in a plunge downwards into humiliation and death. The hill of Golgotha was high and barren and his life's ending was low and shameful.

For the next ten chapters Luke will skillfully trace Jesus' deeds in his urgent trip to Jerusalem. Maybe we can see now why Jesus was so severe with people in the reading for today. He knew what going up to Jerusalem would mean.

In all this there is a question we should think about. Do we want to go along with this man on his journey? What if we hear him say, "The Son of Man has nowhere to rest his head" [and neither will we]? Or, "No one who sets a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God"?

Very harsh.

Wouldn't you or I and turn on our heels and run away?

Yes. But think about it. Jesus is saying that Christianity (and Catholicism) are challenges, not just warm blankets. Jesus values God more than safe sleep, than family funerals, even more than courtesy to relations and friends. None of these are evil or bad, they are good. But they receive their worth from love. God-love. The primary reason for our lives and our deeds is the mission Jesus so urgently invites us to.

Love of God above all.

Love of our neighbor as ourselves, no matter what.



SAINT OF THE WEEK

Thérèse of the Child Jesus, Virgin, 1873-1897



St. Thérèse of the Child Jesus – also known as St. Thérèse of Lisieux and the Little Flower – was born Marie-Françoise-Thérèse Martin in Alençon, France on January 2, 1873. She was the youngest of five surviving children, all girls, of Louis and Azélie-Marie Martin.

Thérèse had a happy childhood, surrounded by good influences. She wrote that her earliest memories were “of smiles and tender caresses”. When her mother died in 1877, her father sold his watchmaking business and moved the family to Lisieux so that the children could be near an aunt who would help to raise them. Mary, an older sister, ran the household and Pauline, the eldest, took charge of the family’s religious training.

When Thérèse was nine, Pauline entered the Carmelite convent at Lisieux, something that Thérèse also longed to do. Mary entered the same convent when Thérèse was nearly fourteen. It was at this time that Thérèse experienced her first vision of the baby Jesus.

During the next few months, Thérèse made known her wish to enter the Carmelite convent. While her father agreed, the Carmelites and the bishop felt that, at fourteen, she was too young. Shortly thereafter, when her father took Thérèse on a pilgrimage to Rome, she boldly spoke up at a general audience with the pope seeking his permission to enter the convent. “You shall enter if it be God’s will,” Pope Leo XIII told her in a kindly dismissal.

Some time later, the bishop gave her permission to enter. Only fifteen, Thérèse joined her two sisters in the Carmelite convent in April, 1888. (A fourth sister, Céline, also entered the convent a few years later after the death of their father.) In the convent, Thérèse was content with the life of hard work and prayer. “I prefer the monotony of obscure sacrifice to all ecstasies. To pick up a pin for love can convert a soul,” echoing her way of life.

Thérèse’s superiors, one of whom was her sister Pauline, recognized the saintliness of this humble girl

and directed her to write her autobiography. This book, *L’histoire d’une âme* (The Story of a Soul), was instantly successful and is still read and loved throughout the world.

During Holy Week in the year 1896, Thérèse took ill. Over the next eighteen months, her disease worsened and she died on September 30, 1897 at the age of twenty-four. Shortly before that, she wrote, “I want to spend my heaven doing good on earth.” She also said that “After my death I will let fall a shower of roses,” a prophecy that has become a sign of the saint’s intercession even to our own time.

Due to her popularity and the miracles which were attributed to her soon after her death, the Holy See dispensed with the period of fifty years which ordinarily elapsed in those days before the beatification process could begin. Pope Pius XI beatified her in 1923 and declared her a saint in 1925.

St. Thérèse of the Child Jesus is the patroness of all foreign missions and of all works for Russia. She is also a patroness of aviators. We honor St. Thérèse with a Memorial on October 1.

Thérèse's message today: “To pick up a pin for love can convert a soul.” Thérèse understood that anything we do for another in God’s name is done for love. Even in doing the humblest and most mundane of chores, Thérèse was serving God in the most magnificent manner. We too should dedicate our daily tasks to God and do them with love.
