NOTES ON THE MASS JUNE 19 2022

Why go to Church?

Many people today, especially young people, say that they do believe in God. They are on a spiritual quest, yes, but they do not need an organized religion to help them.

Sunday's Mass will make the question especially poignant. To put it in the worst light, why would you Catholics go each week to be given a flat wafer called a "host," and perhaps a small sip of wine? It seems like a lot of trouble, and would appear to have very little to do with the spiritual quest.

As Catholics we answer that the host is no longer "bread" but has undergone a "transubstantiation." In simple words, even though it has the appearance of a flat piece of bread, its substance has been transformed from that of bread to that of Christ's body. The same goes for the wine.

The non-church folks might reply, "aren't God and spirituality something interior, something private? If the point is that we should help each other, why can't we do it without all the paraphernalia, without all this 'body and blood' business?"

Again, let us attempt an answer. Go on if you are bored with this.

- (1) Jesus is the speaking-out of God's love. He and the Father are one. The scriptures attest to this.
- (2) Jesus died on the cross in a showdown between goodness and the forces of selfishness and greed.
- (3) Evil won. But at his depths, Christ was deeper than evil. He was made of something stronger than either life or death. This something endured in him, even though he was dead and buried. What was it? God's love. Love founded the life of Jesus. He was the direct expression of God-love. Jesus emerged from the tomb because he was rooted in love.

(4) He ascended into heaven, apparently leaving us behind without him. But he sent the Holy Spirit into the hearts of those who believe, so that he would still be present to us. Pentecost had been the full expression of this fact.

Fine so far: our churchless brothers and sisters would agree. The Holy Spirit of God dwells deep in the wordless depths of a person. You have proved our point. We do not need ceremonies and ritual.

Oh oh. Maybe they are right!

Not quite.

Think of it this way. When you are hungry and you want, say, a hamburger, does thinking about a burger do the job? Or picturing it in your mind? Since your hunger is internal, should it just stay there, with no answer in the material world?

No.

We human beings do have an insides and it is very important, but we have an outside too. We are not built to just stay there within ourselves but also to let our spirits walk, play, and suffer in the material world. The Holy Spirit's presence at the depths of our being makes us desire to find Jesus with our eyes, ears, nose, tongue, hands, and purgations.

So, that is why we go to Church. We want to find a reply to our spiritual quest, now in a fleshly presence—of Christ. At Mass, which is a ritual, we find that presence given to our senses in Communion, and it fulfills our Spiritual and physical yearning.

Are you hungry for Christ? Come and eat. You are what you eat, you know.

NOTES ON THE MASS JUNE 26 2022

Toward Jerusalem

Jesus is fierce in Sunday's Gospel. He is on the march and will not be turned back. Sometimes the readings startle us.

He "rebukes" the disciples.

He shouts "let the dead bury the dead" to a man who wants to bury his father and then follow Jesus.

Jesus is moving fast, and his mood is intense. Get ready for it. But what is the reason for this intensity?

Do you remember back when Jesus began his public ministry before Lent and Easter? He came from the desert filled with the Holy Spirit and headed straight to Nazareth, his home town. He wanted to preach his mission. His own townspeople rejected him. They were more than blunt about it: they tried to throw him off a cliff (Luke 4:14ff).

We had been in the "Galilean Ministry" as scholars call it (Luke 3:1-9:50) (except for the insertion of Lent and Easter). Now a new section of Luke begins. It is called the "Journey to Jerusalem" (Luke 9:51-19:28).

This new phase begins with the rejection of Jesus!

He leaves his home town. The people in Samaritan towns turn him away. He had sent messengers ahead to "warm up the audience," so to speak, but the villagers would not let him enter. Of course, Jews and Samaritans were hostile to each other, and surely that is part of the reason for the rejection of him. But Luke says the real reason is that they knew he was "going up to Jerusalem."

Think about that phrase, "going up to Jerusalem." The "going up" part is literal, since Jerusalem is built upon a hill or rise and you have to climb to get up to it. But Luke wanted the metaphorical sense too. Jesus had set his face to "go up" to the height of the cross.

The Greek word Luke uses for "go up" is the same one used in the Second Book of Kings for the prophet Elijah's ascent into heaven (2 Kings 2:11):

A flaming chariot and flaming horses came ... and Elijah went up to heaven in a whirlwind.

But for Jesus, "going up" will not be in a fiery chariot. His "ascent" will end up in a huge plunge downwards into humiliation and death. The hill of Golgotha was high and barren and his life's ending was low and shameful.

From this point, for the next ten chapters, Luke will skillfully trace Jesus' deeds in his urgent trip to Jerusalem. Maybe we can see now why Jesus was so severe with people in the reading for today. He knew what going up to Jerusalem would mean.

There is a question contained in all this, one we should think about. Do we want to go along with this man on his journey? What if we hear him say, "the Son of Man has nowhere to rest his head." Neither will we. Or, "no one who sets a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God"? Very harsh.

Wouldn't you or I and turn on our heels and run away?

Yes, certainly. But think about it. Jesus is saying that Christianity (and Catholicism) are challenges, not just warm blankets. Jesus values God more than safe sleep, than family funerals, even more than mere courtesy to relations and friends. None of these are evil or bad, they are good. But they receive their worth from love. They are rooted in God-love as was Jesus' life. The primary reason for our existence and our deeds is the mission Jesus so urgently invites us to.

Love of God above all.

Love of our neighbor as ourselves, no matter what.

Question For The Children How can you share what you have received from Jesus with others this week?

Question For The Youth Each week, when we celebrate the Holy Eucharist we are asked to "do this in remembrance of me". How else do you acknowledge the importance of Jesus in your life? Through prayer? Through the ways that you treat others?

Question For The Adults How can you prepare yourself to be nourished by Jesus in the Eucharist this week?

Activity Of The Week Involve family members in preparing a meal for guests. Prepare special signs of hospitality and care. Talk about ways the family can show hospitality in the way you greet guests and care for their needs.



Saint Of The Week Thérèse Lisieux, Virgin

When Thérèse was very young, she wanted to serve God. She gave money to the poor because she worried about them. She entered the convent when she was fifteen years old. Thérèse wrote about serving God in little ways. She trusted God and loved him very much. Thérèse taught other sisters about God. She also wrote a book. People still read her book to learn how to serve God and other people.

Thérèse's message today: "To pick up a pin for love can convert a soul." Thérèse understood that anything we do for another in God's name is done for love. Even in doing the humblest and most mundane of chores, Thérèse was serving God in the most magnificent manner. We too should dedicate our daily tasks to God and do them with love.

BRING THE GOSPEL HOME JUNE 26 2022

Reading I 1 Kings 19: 16b, 19-21 | **Psalm** 16: 1-2, 5, 7-11 | **Reading II Galatians** 5: 1, 13-18 | **Gospel** Luke 9: 51-62

Question For The Children To follow Jesus means to do what is right. Name a time this past week when you followed Jesus by doing the right thing you were asked to do, the first time, without an excuse.

Question For The Youth The people in the story had lots of reasons why they couldn't follow Jesus. What makes it hard to be a disciple of Jesus? Why do you make the choice to follow Jesus even though it is hard?

Question For The Adults Sometimes we are like the people in the Gospel and have many excuses for why we cannot follow Jesus. Name a time this past week that you followed Jesus even though you had many excuses.

Activity Of The Week Ask each member of the family what they would like to be when they are older and why that particular field interests them. Talk about college or other training they will need to accomplish their goal and what they can start doing now as the first steps toward that goal. Talk about how prayer will pay a role in their choices.



Saint Of The Week Irenaeus, Bishop

Irenaeus was born in Asia Minor, became a priest in early adulthood, and was considered the first great theologian in the Church. He was a disciple of Polycarp, who was a disciple of Saint John, Apostle and Evangelist. Polycarp sent Irenaeus to work with the Bishop in Gaul to quell the false interpretation of Sacred Scripture spread by Mantanus and his followers. Irenaeus was known for evangelization and his defense of Christianity against the Gnostic heresy as well. He is credited for eliminating the thread of Gnosticism to Christianity. Irenaeus restored peace between the Eastern and Western Church, which was resolved permanently following the Council of Nicea, when both conformed to the western calendar.

Irenaeus's Message Today

If we are to defend our faith well, we need to know what sets it apart from other religions. For Catholics today, the documents of the Second Vatican Council provide a strong basis for understanding the principles of our Church in the twentieth century.
