

Thirteenth Sunday of Ordinary Time

Ordinary Time For a large part of the liturgical year, we devote ourselves to listening to the mystery of Christ in all its aspects unfolded as we seek God's truth and understanding.

Reading I : Wisdom 1:13-15; 2:23-24

God does not make death.

- The author of the Book of Wisdom gives some insight into life after death.
- The idea of resurrection began to emerge in Israel only in the final two centuries before Christ.
- Today's reading presents the idea that righteousness cannot die. Therefore, the human relationship with God cannot die.

Reading II: 2 Corinthians 8:7, 9, 13-15

May you abound in your work of charity.

- In the second reading Paul encourages the Corinthian community to be generous in a collection for the poor Christians in Jerusalem.
- This kind of generosity, especially when it involves sacrifice, reveals the presence of the Holy Spirit.
- Giving to a community in need of financial support is a sign of church unity.

Gospel : Mark 5:21-43

The family's astonishment was complete!

- Jesus' miracles are a sign that the power of Satan is broken and the kingdom of God has arrived.
- The miracle in the center of today's Gospel is sandwiched between the parts of another. This is one of Mark's favorite techniques.
- One touch of Jesus' clothing and the woman with the hemorrhage is healed. The power of Satan is broken, and new life has entered the world.



Reading I Wisdom 1:13-15; 2:23-24 | Psalm | Reading II 2 Corinthians 8:7, 9, 13-15 | Gospel Mark 5:21-43

Question For The Children What does sharing with others bring happiness to you?

Question For The Youth What are some of the miraculous moments in your own life? Do you ever pray for miracles?

Question For The Adults What is your personal response to St. Paul's instruction to the Corinthians today? How will this change your personal habits with money and possessions?

Activity Of The Week With faith in Jesus, miracles and healing happens. Pray for someone who needs God's strength and healing in their lives.

Saint of the Week: Junípero Serra, Priest, 1713-1784 No person had more influence on the settlement of California than Padre Junípero Serra. He was born Miguel José Serra to parents of humble means, living in Petra on the Mediterranean island of Majorca. His early education took place on the island at the Franciscan convent of San Bernardino. The church there had several small chapels on either side of the main altar dedicated to saints. Young Miguel developed a strong love for these saints while attending Mass, and their names including San Diego, San Juan Capistrano, Nuestra Señora de Los Angeles, San Franciscolater became the names of the cities and missions which he established along the Camino Real in California.

Miguel was ordained in 1737, and took the name Junípero at that time. In the same year, he was named a professor of philosophy at the university in Palma, Spain. He continued with his studies and, in 1742, earned a doctorate in theology. A year later, he was selected to the Dun Scotus chair of theology at the university. He also became renowned as a preacher on the island and was chosen to preach on the highest holy days.

These honors could have been just the beginning for the young priest. His biographers note that he would probably have become the superior of the Franciscans and could very well have been named Bishop of Palma had he remained on Majorca. This was not his calling however. Since he was a boy, Junípero Serra had dreamed of becoming a missionary in the New World. When the opportunity came, he joined about thirty other Franciscan missionaries who sailed to Mexico, arriving on December 2, 1749. For most of the next twenty years, Padre Serra served as a missionary in the harsh environment of the Sierra Madres of northeastern Mexico and as a professor at the College of San Fernando in Mexico City.

Prior to 1768, the Jesuits had established many missions in Mexico and in Baja California. But a dispute with King Carlos III of Spain in that year led to the order being forcibly ejected from their missions and the priests sent back to Spain. To ensure that Spain would maintain a strong position in the New World, the king ordered the Franciscans to take over the Jesuit missions in Baja California and to establish new missions north along the coast in the Spanish claimed territory, which extended north to present-day British Columbia. Junípero Serra was selected to lead the Franciscan missionaries in this new assignment.

Serra believed that the colonization of California was secondary to the conversion of the Indians and his lifework reflected this. His biographers write of his love for his "dear children," the more than 6700 Indians whom he baptized and the more than 5000 whom he confirmed. During the period in which Padre Serra worked among the Indians, he raised the health and living standards and introduced training in agriculture, letters, crafts, and music.

A man of vision, Junípero Serra's concept was to build a "ladder" of missions one day's journey apart between San Diego and San Francisco. Between 1769 and 1782, Padre Serra actually established nine missions along this route, most of which are still active today.

Padre Serra's message today: Junípero Serra undertook a bold journey in coming to the New World. Our physical travels may not be as far-reaching as Serra's, but we are all on a spiritual journey whose course can often be as dramatic. We, too, can hold steadfast to our goal of reaching God's kingdom.



Fourteenth Sunday of Ordinary Times

Ordinary Time For a large part of the liturgical year, we devote ourselves to listening to the mystery of Christ in all its aspects unfolded as we seek God's truth and understanding.

Reading I: Ezekiel 2:2-5

I am sending you.

- Prophets are called by God to proclaim the message of salvation.
- Suffering and rejection are bound to come with the call.
- In the first reading, Ezekiel is sent to bring God's message to hard hearted and obstinate people.

Reading II: 2 Corinthians 12:7-10

When I am powerless, I am actually strong.

- The Corinthian community requests evidence of Paul's authority.
- Evidently, Paul is kept humble by some sort of affliction.
- Paul recognizes that the power of God is made known in his weakness.

Gospel : Mark 6:1-6a

What kind of wisdom is he endowed with?

- The Gospel of Mark was written for early Christians experiencing persecution for their faith.
- The rejection Jesus experienced in Nazareth hindered his power because of the people's lack of faith.
- In today's passage, Mark presents a foreshadowing of the final rejection Jesus will experience at the time of his death.



Reading I Ezekiel 2:2-5 | Psalm Ps 123:1-2, 2, 3-4 | Reading II 2 Corinthians 12:7-10 | Gospel Mark 6:1-6a

Question For The Children What helps you have deeper faith in Jesus?

Question For The Youth When have you struggled to speak the truth among your friends? What makes this difficult? What are the consequences?

Question For The Adults Name a time when you placed your trust in God even though those around you did not believe.

Activity Of The Week A prophet is someone filled with God's love. Share a story of someone who brought you God's love this week.

Saint of the Week: Antonio Maria Zaccaria, Priest, 1502-1539 Antonio was born into a wealthy family in Cremona, Italy in 1502. His parents, Lazzaro and Antonia had been married a year when he was born. His father died a year after his birth. His mother, only eighteen at the time her husband's death, devoted her life to Antonio. She taught him about God and his mercies and about Jesus. To give him an appreciation for those around him in Cremona who were not as well off, she had Antonio distribute alms to those in need.

Given an excellent education, Antonio earned his medical degree in 1524 and returned to Cremona to set up his practice. Soon, however, he found that many of the people that he was treating needed more than the physical care that he could provide. In many ways, they were suffering spiritually more that bodily. It was at this time that he felt a call to religious life and began the study of theology.

Ordained in 1528, Antonio gave his inheritance to his mother and began to provide spiritual and medical care to the poor. Moving to Milan, he, together with some other priests, founded a new order, the Congregation of the Clerks of St. Paul. Recognizing the success that the order was having in ministering to the spiritual needs of the people of Milan, Pope Clement VII approved the order in 1533 with Antonio as its superior.

In 1536, Antonio resigned as superior in favor of Father Bartholomew Ferrari, one of the priests with whom he had founded the order. At this point, Fr. Antonio sought a more suitable church in Milan for the order. St. Barnabas Church was offered and became the headquarters of the order, which then came to be known as the Barnabites. It was also around this time that Fr. Antonio helped Countess Louisa Torelli found an order of uncloistered nuns, the Angelicals of St. Paul, whose ministry paralleled that of the Barnabites.

All of this activity took its physical toll on Antonio and he came down with a fever, which, he recognized, would be his final illness. Returning to his mother's house, he received the final sacraments and died on July 5th 1539.

Saint Antonio-Maria was canonized by Pope Leo XIII in 1897. A memorial honors this saint on July 5.

Antonio-Maria's message today: God's calling to us may come in steps. This saint found that his study of medicine helped him to see to the physical ills of the people of Milan. Soon, he found that this was only the first step in what God was asking of him.
