GREETINGS,

A reminder about Masses. As you likely know by now, Bishop Joensen has mandated masks/face coverings for all those 5 years old and up who attend Mass in our diocese. This is very much a part of calling to love of neighbor. According to the latest CDC guidance, masks help the wearer to avoid contracting this virus and also help the wearer to not spread it to others. It is truly an act of charity toward others. The mask should be used throughout Mass, with the exception of the brief moment when Communion is received. If you feel you may need an exemption, please see me so we can discuss this. We will have extra masks on hand for those who may forget theirs on a given day.

One seating reminder: As you know, we have the rows laid out with areas that are closed as well as number cards indicating how many people can sit in a particular section of an open row. When you arrive, please fill in from the front of the church first, especially if you have 1, 2 or 3 people as the shorter rows are at the front of the church. This will allow us to accommodate more people. I have observed that most of the time the front row of each section is left empty. I know this is different for many, but your help and cooperation with this is greatly appreciated.

We are currently beginning to plan for Christmas Masses. As you might guess, our Christmas celebrations will look different than in a normal year. More details to come. The Mass obligation will remain suspended, including the Christmas obligation. Christmas Masses will be livestreamed.

As you know, we are now at the time of year when we are looking to next year's budget and our needs. We want to continue providing the services in the ministries that you find helpful. To be able to do that in a high-quality way we do need your financial support in tithing. You should have received a letter from me with your tithing pledge card. I ask that you give this your most prayerful consideration as you reflect on what you will be able to do in the coming year in support of our parish. Thank you for whatever you can give to Holy Trinity.

We are beginning to wind down this year's Annual Appeal. Thank you so much to all who contributed to this effort. If you still have a pledge outstanding, please do all in your power to complete this commitment. Thank you for your continued generosity toward, and support of, Holy Trinity.



The 2020 Dinner in December has been postponed.





Dear Friends in Christ,

The Diocese of Des Moines will take up the national collection for the Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD) the weekend of November 21/22. Your support for this collection brings change to communities across the country and empowers those living in poverty to transform the places where they live into reflections of the Kingdom of God. In addition to the national impact, those living in poverty in our own diocese may benefit through the 25% share of our collection that stays in the Des Moines diocese.

Our parishes and community service groups in the Diocese of Des Moines can apply for grants from the local portion of the Catholic Campaign for Human Development collection. Typically, grants are allocated up to \$1,500. In 2019, two local grants were awarded: New Vision Homeless Services in Council Bluffs and St. John's Catholic Church in Adel, in support of their Good Samaritan Food Pantry and Kids Backpack Program.

Your support for this collection makes a difference for families living in poverty across the United States. The need is greater still this year, as those whom can least afford it have been hardest hit by the economic impact of the pandemic.

SPIRITUALITYOF THE READING The Gospel Realm

Matthew's great parable of the last judgment presents the glorified Son of Man, with an entourage of angels, rising before the nations of the world. The blessed and lost are separated by one norm: the care of others. Inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the creation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink. I was a stranger and you welcomed me, naked and you clothed me. I was ill and you comforted me, in prison and you came to visit me. (Gospel)

We all bear the presence of the Most High, no matter how diminished or devalued we may seem.

This proclamation is formulated four times in the course of the parable. It is worth the four repetitions. For, like many gospel passages, we have heard the words so often that they seem ordinary, even though they are the most revolutionary claims about the human condition that have ever been made.

In all the ways that God has been revealed to high human consciousness, there has been one abiding theme: the dignity and value of the human person. The ancient Chinese may have been among the first to formulate it: never do to others what you would not have done to yourself. Archaic Babylonian law commanded that we show good will to others. The mighty Egyptians were told, "Terrorize not a human." Buddha reached enlightenment only when he embarked on the life of compassion for others. And Jewish faith, parent of both Christianity and Islam, revealed the source of the truth: "Male and female God created them; in God's own image were they created."

For Christians, this revelation of God reached its apex in the Incarnation: the Word of God became human flesh to save us. Thus it is strategic that Matthew, immediately before the narrative of Jesus' passion and death, presents the scene of the last judgment as a metaphor wherein the least human person is identified with the Lord of history.

Before our own times entire tribes of indigenous peoples disappeared in North and South America, sacrificed to idols of gold. Jews were banished or forcibly converted long before the abominable "final solution." Holy "religious" wars were launched in the name of God. Children of every color and tribe have been traded or killed upon birth.

To such a bleak history, the Lord of history has spoken: "As often as you have done this to the least of my brothers and sisters, you have done it to me."

Like all of holy scripture, the parable of the end times is a judgment on the world. In human mayhem, we dismember the body of Christ. "You have done it to me." The starving, the unwanted old and unborn, the criminal, the enemy—"the least"—are him.

This judgment of God is a moral command as well. In the eyes of Christ's followers, the bodies of the wounded and murdered are bodies of Christ. Thus, killing is sacrilege. All wars are unholy. Any "choice" to kill a human being is an ungodly act.

Scripture, in its greatest depth, does not merely present a moral challenge or a judgment on the world. Nor is it a program for political or social action, or a self-help book. It is, rather, a story of the mystery of salvation.

For at the end of history, Jesus Christ, the Word of God made human flesh, addresses also the one who sent him:

"Whatsoever you do to the least of my brothers and sisters, you do unto me." These words that challenge us are the very words that save us.

What if, in our thinking, our praying, and our writing about scripture, we accepted it as if it were real? What if the Word of God is actually true on all levels of our lives—true for a world of nations, politics, or economies; true for our relations with each other; true for each of us in our hearts; true of God?

If you and I accept, with all our mind and will, the promise of God's Word, perhaps then we shall fully understand the soaring words of Paul: "Christ must reign until God has put all enemies under his feet, and the last enemy to be destroyed is death."



SAINT OF THE WEEK

Andrew Dung-Lac, Priest and Martyr

Saint Andrew Dung-Lac and his 116 companions represent the more than one hundred thousand martyrs killed during the persecutions of Christians which took place periodically beginning in the 17th Century and running though most of the 19th Century in Viet Nam. He was born Dung An Trân around 1795 to a poor pagan family in northern Viet Nam. He was instructed in the Christian faith and, three years later, he was baptized, taking the name Andrew at that time. As a parish priest, Andrew lived a simple life, fasting often and providing a model for the people in his town, many of whom were baptized by him. He was imprisoned and killed for his faith in 1938.

Andrew's message today: Saint Andrew and his companions, as well as the many thousands of unnamed martyrs in Viet Nam, provide powerful examples of the perseverance that strong faith can bring to those who are persecuted. Even today in Viet Nam, as well as elsewhere, persecution of Christians continues, but prayer can strengthen our faith.

While not likely to face the kind of persecution that these saints experienced, is your faith strong enough to face the ridicule that is more likely to come your way? Pray that God will give you the strength to bear up to the scorn that may come your way and to pray for your persecutors.
