

The first trimester focus this year is on...





As a school, staff will require students to wear masks when entering the building, exiting the building, in high traffic common areas, and when working in close proximity when proper distancing or PPE such as shields/plexiglass isn't available.

However, as a parent, you have the ability to ask your child to wear their mask more frequently, even the entire day if you choose.

Whether or not to wear their mask outside of the required time frame will be up to the individual families to decide and enforce. Please communicate with the classroom teacher your wishes but understand that the family is responsible for enforcing this.

Please practice removing and putting on masks—school personnel cannot put on masks for children.

We will measure square footage to properly social distance in the classrooms. Masks will be worn when social distancing is not possible. When social distancing is possible, masks may be removed. Small reading-math groups will take place with masks.

Please have enough masks so you are able to wash them daily.

Multiple businesses are currently selling face masks for kids. If you need assistance in locating masks, please contact the school office. Please let us know if this places any financial burden on your family so we can help! (5 masks x 4 kids adds up quickly!)

We are measuring the classroom space and the number of students that plan to return for inclassroom learning to assure that we can give the 6 feet of space required to remove masks.

Masks will be worn many times throughout the day when social distancing is not possible.



Correct handwashing will be taught and reviewed weekly in the homeroom classes. Handwashing will be used as often as possible. Age-appropriate video links are in our Return to Learn Plan for teachers to use in the classroom to teach and review handwashing and safety.

Hand sanitizer will also be encouraged. Each classroom will have multiple sanitizers available. Students may have their own hand sanitizer with them throughout the day. Please know that if they are playing with them or using them inappropriately, the teachers will have students put them away. Examples include- eating it, squirting it on someone else, using it profusely or if it is causing a distraction in the classroom. Please opt for light or generic scents, some smells can trigger migraines or asthma.

Hand sanitizer will also be available throughout the school building.





Students will not be able to use water fountains. We do have a water bottle filling station and students will be encouraged to use it. Please bring in a bottle of water daily for your children-labeled. It will go home daily to be washed. Please do not add ice. Ice causes condensation to form and will make the bottle and desk wet.

Based on guidance from the diocese, parents will be responsible for taking students' temperatures at home. Please let us know if you do not have a thermometer. Holy Trinity staff will be taking temperatures of all students upon arrival. If your child has a temperature of 100.0 or above they will be sent to the office where our school nurse will further assess your child's health.





Powerschool is our online student information system and must be updated by parents every year. Your current contact information with your emergency contact who lives in the Des Moines area must be updated before your child will be allowed to attend school. PLEASE NOTE: Powerschool eReg will be operating as of Monday July 27.

Back to School Night is a time where families and students have the opportunity to meet the teachers, drop off school supplies, and visit their classrooms.

This year, students and families will be given a specific time frame and directions at a later date to attend this event. Masks will be required and temperatures will be taken at the door.

Kindly understand, we cannot stay and socialize inside Holy Trinity this year.

Every student's Powerschool account that has been updated before Back to School Night will receive a free jeans day pass. Family accounts that are updated in Powerschool before Back to School Night will also be entered into a drawing. Two families will win \$250.00 off of tuition.

We will have booths outside, weather permitting, for various school information. Please remember to visit these. If we are inside for the evening-the booths will be in different areas around the school; kindly pass through quickly and save the socializing for outside.



Parents will not be able to take the typical first day of school pictures.

As an alternative, we would like to provide families with the opportunity to take the first day of school pictures before school starts.

Parents can dress their child in school uniforms and come to Holy Trinity for a picture a week before school begins. The schedule will come out shortly.

We will have picture stations including the wings-the rock- and maybe a frame. This will be entirely optional for families- masks are encouraged.

This does not replace school pictures in September.

First Day of School: Students will have grade level doors to come in and will either go directly to Kids Connection or their classrooms depending on the time of their arrival. This will be the same door they came in for Back to School Night. There will be signs directing families on where to go.

The doors will be locked at 8:10 and tardy students will need to check in at the front office. The doors will be labeled and sanitized often.



For Lunch: grades Preschool-1st will eat socially distanced in the cafeteria.

Grades 2-8 will get their lunches (masked) in the cafeteria and either take them back to the classroom or go outside for a picnic. Teachers may be requesting towels for outdoor lunches.

Students will be responsible for cleaning their area of the classroom and will not be responsible for cleaning any other space. We are using sealable reusable containers rather than trays to reduce spills and keep food hot. They will be sanitized daily.

Recess will be staggered throughout the day. We are looking into having walking trips around the neighborhood and to the parks in Beaverdale. We are hoping to give them a lot of fresh air!

Attached is a one-time field trip form to allow teachers to take your child off-campus and around Beaverdale including parks and businesses. Teachers will let families know weekly plans for this, but you will only need to sign one field trip permission form for the year.

IMPORTANT: Please return the field trip form on back to school night.



First day of school-Monday prayer service for K families on the first day- Monday-August 24 Middle school volunteers will welcome parishioners on the first Monday morning with masks.

Mass will start at 8:30 every morning and these grade levels will meet in the church after they drop off their backpacks in their classrooms. We will still wear our red Holy Trinity polos on Wednesdays. Students may wear other uniform shirt colors on Tuesday and Thursday during this COVID schedule.

The school nurse will have two separate rooms for the 2020-2021 school year. One room will be for children that are presenting sick and will be disinfected after each use.

The other office will be for well children receiving medication-bandaids-ice- etc. and will be disinfected after each use. If your child takes medication throughout the day they will go to the office with a mask on and receive their medicine when needed.

Our teachers and staff go through yearly health and safety training offered through AEA. Prior to the school year, they will be provided additional training in the areas of safely cleaning and disinfecting at work and COVID-19 training.





The Diocese of Des Moines has been collaborating on a Health and Safety Protocol to be used by all of our schools. These protocols have been created in collaboration with MercyOne, UnityPoint, and a family physician. This document is still under internal review and will be shared as soon as possible.

What will be our school's protocol for students and staff when a COVID-19 diagnosis is made?

- The school is notified of a positive COVID-19 diagnosis
- 2. The school will contact the Polk County Health Department for the next steps
- The school administrator will notify the Catholic Schools Office
- 4. The school will clean and disinfect the school as directed by the Polk County Health Department
- 5. The school will notify individuals and families as directed by the Polk County Health Department
- The school will take any other steps directed by the Polk County Health Department, including closure

How will we ensure privacy and confidentiality are maintained?

Our school will clearly communicate our privacy plan to staff and families. Upon receiving word of a positive COVID-19 diagnosis, Holy Trinity will contact the Polk Health Department and the Office of Catholic Schools. The school will follow the guidance of the Polk County Health Department regarding cleaning, notification, and possible closure. The individual names of those with a positive COVID-19 diagnosis will not be shared unless directed by the Polk County Health Department as part of the notification process.

If Holy Trinity staff become aware of the names of those with a positive COVID-19 diagnosis, they will not share that information with anyone except school administrators.



What is our process to send staff home as soon as possible if they arrive sick or become sick?

- Holy Trinity will follow our current policy for sending staff home that are sick or have a temperature of 100.3 or above. We will reiterate our sick policy during in-service prior to the start of the school year.
- If a staff member suspects they are ill, they should come immediately to the health office. The health
 office will screen and monitor the staff member as they would normally.
- During in-service, staff will develop a coverage plan to quickly adapt if a staff member needs to leave school. The principal will assist with creating coverage plans as needed and will approve final plans.

What is our process to send students home as soon as possible if they arrive sick or become sick?

- Holy Trinity will follow our current policy for sending students home that are sick or have a temperature of 100.3 or above. Families will be expected to pick up the child as soon as possible.
- If a teacher or staff member suspects a child is ill, the child will be sent to the health office. The health
 office will screen and monitor the child as they would normally.
- All students must have their PowerSchool E-Registration completed prior to coming to school. All
 emergency contacts will be double-checked by the school office to ensure all spaces are filled and that
 they are not the parents.

If a class or individual needs to be quarantined virtual learning will be an option for all of our families.



We are hoping to have real-time learning. Teachers will be recording their lessons in real time and students will need to sign in to participate through an online platform. Please make sure and sign up on the google form that was sent out early this week if you are interested in online learning for your student. If there are any issues that you foresee with technology in your home, please contact the school office.

- Distance Learning is not homeschooling
- Your child's learning will be planned, supported, and assessed by a certified educator
- Students may be required to occasionally come to campus for assessments and other potential meetings based on their individual needs
- Participation in online learning requires active, regular commitment from the school and the family.
- Students remain fully enrolled at the school and are accountable for all school policies, procedures, and discipline
- With distance learning, this includes a civility and academic integrity clause, as well as a technology acceptable use policy
- Students will need access to a device (computer, iPad, etc.) and a consistent, reliable internet connection -if there is a concern, your local school may be able to assist
- A commitment to distance learning will be for an entire trimester/semester
- Participation in online learning is a collaborative partnership between the school and the family--should this partnership not be productive, school administration retains the right to evaluate the online partnership
- Regular attendance will be required as part of continuous learning
- Families enrolled in distance learning remain active members of their local school community and will be responsible for the same tuition/fee schedule as traditional students

Diocese of Des Moines Catholic Schools Announce Reopening Plan for the 2020-2021 School Year

August 7, 2020, Des Moines, IA — The Diocese of Des Moines released a comprehensive plan to re-open its sixteen schools this fall. All diocesan PS-8th grade schools plan to re-open for in-person instruction in August, and parents will have choices regarding learning options to meet their child's needs including five-day-a-week in-person instruction or a fully-remote learning option.

"It remains our goal to open our school doors for on-site learning for the first day of school," said Donna Bishop, Superintendent of Schools. "For some families however, the remote learning option may be necessary for medical or other reasons. Our schools are prepared to partner with any family that would like to explore the remote learning option for their child."

Key components of the reopening plan address the health and safety of students, teachers and staff while at school. These key components include: Health and Safety Measures, Academic Quality, Learning Options for Families, Continuity of Education, Social-Emotional Health, and School-Home Communications. Mitigation strategies outlined in the plan were developed in collaboration with local public health officials and health professionals to solidify decisions related to best practices surrounding infectious disease control.

Bishop added, "We recognize that this is a fluid situation, and we will continue to revise protocols and update parents as we approach the opening of school."

Parents were notified of the diocesan-wide reopening plan earlier this week and individual school Return-to-Learn plans approved by the Iowa Department of Education are posted on each school's website. In the event that schools are directed to close again, all students will be able to quickly pivot to remote learning that continues their rigorous and personalized education.

"We understand the importance of establishing a positive, safe and supportive learning environment as our students navigate the unprecedented challenges due to the disruptions caused by the pandemic," shared Bishop. "We want to ensure student learning continues. Schools are working with families to meet their individual needs. No student will miss out on a high quality education because of this virus."

The Diocese of Des Moines Catholic Schools includes 16 schools in 23 counties in central and southwest Iowa. Catholic schools in the Des Moines Diocese build Christ-centered, collaborative, inclusive partnerships with parents, students, and parishes to provide innovative academic excellence and inspirational faith formation for students.





SAINT OF THE WEEK

Jane Frances de Chantal, Wife, Mother and Religious

Jane Frances was born in Dijon, France. At the age of twenty, she married Baron Christopher de Chantal. The couple had seven children, three of whom died in infancy. When her husband died in a hunting accident in 1601, Jane Frances sank into a depression. She and her children moved into her father-in-law's house when he threatened to disinherit her children. Despite his oppressiveness, she managed to regain her cheerfulness and raise her children in a happy atmosphere. Inspired by Francis de Sales, Jane made provisions for her children's care and, along with three other women, formed the first community of Visitation nuns. During the last years of her life, Jane suffered a spiritual dryness. She overcame these cares and worries by losing herself in God. "To live no more in oneself, but lost in God, is the most sublime perfection which the soul can reach," was Jane Frances' advice to those with misgivings and concerns.

All of us experience spiritual dryness at some point in our lives, a time when God seems to have abandoned us. Jane's advice "to live no more in oneself, but lost in God," offers wise words of counsel. We can persevere, as she did, in our faith life despite not feeling connected to God.

SPIRITUALITY OF THE READINGS

It Takes Two

On previous Sundays Jesus has been curing people. Yet an odd thing happens in each case. He tells them, "Your faith has saved you." Which is it? Quite obviously Jesus does the healing, so why does he say their faith did it? Why didn't he just say "Go in peace, I have healed you"?

Let us seek the answer in Sunday's <u>Gospel</u>. This will be a roundabout way to get at an answer, so I ask you to wait for it.

Jesus is in Caesarea Philippi and the disciples are just back from their mission of preaching. Jesus asks them who people think he is.

The disciples laugh boyishly and repeat some answers they have heard. Obviously they regard these guesses as absurd. Something like this:

Believe it or not, some think you are John the Baptist returned from the dead!

The ones I talked to said you were the prophet Elijah! It was hilarious!

A few of them said you are Jeremiah or one of the other prophets! They just don't know what to make of you.

Laughter all around.

But Jesus' question had been a curve ball, and now it crosses the plate. He says abruptly, "And what about you? Who do you say I am?"

Eyes wander, feet scuff, laughter turns into a cough. The disciples' faith is still young and perhaps they are confused about it, not to mention the fact that up to this point they have not been required to profess anything out loud. Red faces.

Peter is bold, awkwardly, walking on water again, figuratively this time. He stammers out his best answer.

You ... you are ... the, uh, ... yes, uh, the ... the Son of ... you are the Christ, the Son of the living God!

Silence and then nods and relief all around.

"Simon, how great is your faith," Jesus says. "Whatever you open with this faith will stay open. Whatever your faith shuts will remain shut, not only here but in heaven." A high compliment to Peter's tottering belief status.

But does this answer the contradiction we began with? Is it Jesus or their act of faith?

Jesus is always seeking a two-way liaison between himself and us, not just one-way. He wants us to have a relationship to the fullness of who he is. Besides being a charismatic leader or a good friend, he is the very reality of God's love, present in the world, wide open to loving each of us. Therefore he wants a mutual love-relationship with you and me, one in which we open up our hearts and let Godly love in.

The name of that openness to God's love on the part of a person is "faith."

Faith.

The answer is truly "Your faith has saved you." But it is faith as an opening up to Jesus' cures. These are never just a matter of him acting on his own, like a mechanic replacing spark plugs. They are love being given and love being received. The ones who were cured must have opened themselves and have at least a beginning relationship with Jesus as the loving Messiah. Healing is at last able to take root.

So, in fact, it surely is their faith that saves them, together with the love from Jesus. The healing power of that love could never get to them unless the open heart named "faith" were finally awakened in them.


